Human Trafficking Awareness Month

Slavery still exists. The International Labour Organization estimates that 40.3 million people worldwide are victims of human trafficking, also known as modern day slavery. One in four of those victims is a child.

Huntsville Mayor **Tommy Battle** officially proclaimed January 2019 as Human Trafficking Awareness Month in Huntsville at the January 10th City Council Meeting. JLH Human Trafficking Awareness Committee members **Deborah Powell** and **Julie Johnson** and **Rick Tate**, Vice Chair of the North Alabama Human Trafficking Task Force received the Proclamation from the Mayor.



Madison Mayor **Paul Finley** officially proclaimed January 2019 as Human Trafficking Awareness Month in Madison at the January 14th City Council Meeting. JLH Human Trafficking Awareness Committee member **Megan Zingarelli** and **Pat McCay**, Chair of the Alabama Human Trafficking Task Force received the Proclamation from the Mayor.

The JLH and the **Knights of Columbus Council 764** hosted a screening of the movie "8 Days" on January 8 at Holy Spirit Catholic Church. Members of the North Alabama Human Trafficking Task Force were on hand to answer questions. The JLH worked to support **Safe Harbor Youth Shelter**, a local safe house that helps youth who have been victims of human trafficking, or who have been susceptible to the crime of trafficking due to homelessness, to get back on their feet. The JLH collected supplies and raised \$480.79 through a **Kendra Scott** shopping event.



The Butterfly Project

About the JLH's Butterfly Project

The Butterfly Project rewards deserving girls from each public high school in Madison County who show commitment to academia, exhibit leadership, and demonstrate an ability to persevere in the face of hardship. School counselors choose ten girls from their respective schools, all of whom are invited to participate in the Butterfly Project. Participants are invited to shop at the Butterfly Boutique, where they select a formal dress and accessories for prom at no cost and apply for Monarch Scholarships to further their education. These deserving young women receive not only a prom night transformation, but also get to see what the Junior League is all about: philanthropic service! Scholarship winners also receive assistance toward earning an education to transform their lives forever. It is our hope that as these future leaders are recognized and rewarded for their initiative and drive they will feel inspired to continue to work toward their goals and understand the value of giving back to their community.

Butterfly Project in the Community

Butterfly Project has had an amazing year! For the first time, we invited our Butterfly students to volunteer alongside Junior League of Huntsville members at various community projects throughout the year.

We were happy to have many Butterfly volunteers present at both Children First and One on One volunteer nights. Our students were excited to volunteer with us, and JLH members were happy to have them in attendance! Many of our students' parents also attended volunteer nights with them, and all were excited to learn more about the JLH.

Butterfly Scholarships

As the league year comes to an end, Butterfly Project is excited to award over \$10,000 to our Monarch Scholarship winners. A HUGE thank you to [Torch Technologies](#) for their generous donation of \$3,000 toward our scholarship awards! This year's scholarship applications focused on volunteerism, including an essay on the impact of volunteering.



As part of the Provisional Class's BIRTHday Books project with the [Huntsville Hospital Foundation](#), two small groups from the Provisional Class provided dinner for families with babies in the NICU at [Huntsville Hospital's Center for Women and Children](#) on Sunday, February 10th. The Provisionals worked hard to get food and supplies donated by local businesses. [Lawler's Barbecue](#), [Uncle Maddio's Pizza](#), and [Valerie Brown Law, LLC](#) all generously contributed to the meal.

Provisional members who participated were able to interact with some of the families there and were touched by many of the stories they heard. They met a mom whose miracle baby was born weighing only 14oz. Her baby has been in the NICU for over a month and she's had to go back to work so she spends every minute she's not working up at the hospital. The night of the meal was only the fourth time she'd been able to hold her daughter. They met a young father whose wife had been in a bad car accident that forced her to have an emergency C-Section. The wife is recovering in the ICU and his baby is in the NICU. There was also a Mom whose baby has been in the NICU for 40 days. She said she has learned to time her bathroom breaks just right because she's only allowed to hold her daughter for three hours a day, and if she has to put her baby down at anytime during those three hours her visit will be over.

Huntsville Hospital is the only Level III NICU in all of North Alabama, which means babies from all over our region are there receiving life-saving medical care. This means that families often have to travel great distances and go to extreme lengths to visit their newborns. Providing a meal for them and giving them a chance to take a break from all the planning and logistical work that goes into coordinating their days may seem like a small gesture, but it truly has a big impact. In addition to being one less thing for them to worry about the meal also provides a chance for them to sit and connect with some of the other families in similar situations.

This is the second meal that the Provisional Class has provided for the NICU this year. They will host one more dinner for NICU families in April.

Amanda Thrasher Segrest
1949-2019

Amanda Grace Thrasher Segrest, 70, of Huntsville, passed away peacefully in her home Tuesday. Amanda was born in Huntsville to Dorothy Wright and Tom Goodman Thrasher. In the 9th grade at Huntsville Junior High, Amanda met her life-long sweetheart and husband of 47 years, Mike Segrest. After graduating from Huntsville High School in 1967, she attended Sweet Briar College in Virginia, before graduating from the University of Alabama, where she was a member of Kappa Kappa Gamma sorority.

In 1972, Amanda began her distinguished 25-year career of teaching English at Grissom High School, where she soon became English Department Chairman. While teaching and raising her family, she also followed her passion for community service. Amanda's civic work touched many non-profits in the Huntsville area. Her resume of volunteerism and servant leadership is extensive, chairing or serving as president of numerous boards, including: The Grace Club of Huntsville; Junior League of Huntsville; The Arts Council; Rotary Ann; the Antiquarian Society; Kappa Huntsville Alumnae Association; and the Greater Huntsville Panhellenic Alumnae Association.

Amanda also served on the boards of the Alabama School of Fine Arts and the Huntsville Hospital Foundation, founding and serving as the first president of Angels for Children. She then went on to serve on the Huntsville Classic Dinner & Golf Tournament Committee, the foundation's signature event. Together, Amanda and Mike chaired the UAH President's Council. She was a member of the Twickenham Chapter of Daughters of the American Revolution, and enjoyed several bridge clubs with friends. She was a member of Huntsville First United Methodist Church, where she co-chaired the capital campaign, and taught Sunday school for children and adults.

Amanda's most significant community contribution may have been her role as chair of the Junior League committee that researched, developed and launched Huntsville's iconic city-wide arts festival, Panoply.

Survivors include her husband, James Michael Segrest; three children, Jordan Segrest Bishop (Harrison), Ellen Segrest Fortin (James), and Clay Michael Segrest (Corie); five grandchildren, Wright and Helen Bishop, Abby Fortin, and Callan and Scarlett Segrest; and her three sisters, Sherry T. Langley, Carol T. Mayo (Don), and Anne T. Swain (Al).

Visitation was from 1:00 to 3:00 p.m. Sunday, February 10 at Huntsville First United Methodist Church. The funeral service followed at 3:00 p.m. with the Rev. Coy Hallmark and the Rev. Dr. Glenn Conner officiating. A private family burial was immediately after the service at Maple Hill Cemetery.
